- Feel free to make your story topic you want and I imagine you all have some very creative ideas.


STEPS

1. Get Scratch.


- There are TWO WAYS to use Scratch. The first is going to Scratch website, https://scratch.mit.edu/, and then go to "CREATE". You can save your work by either creating an account and your work will be saved there, OR simply do File: save to your computer and file will be found in your downloads folder.
- Another option is to download Scratch desktop. That means the Scratch program
 will always be on your computer and you will no longer need internet to use it.
 You can also save to any place on the computer that you prefer.

2. Find Tutorial on "Creating a story."

• Once you are in Scratch, find the "**Tutorials**" button which is at the top and has a lightbulb next to it.



• Once there, you should be able to find the tutorial that says "CREATE A STORY." It has a picture of a wizard and a witch.



3. Follow the tutorials and create your story.

• You can watch the tutorial video, follow the slides, or both, and then start programing your story!!! I encourage you all to check out the tutorials first if you have any questions.

4. Save and share if you wish.

- Whether you are working online or on Scratch desktop, make sure you save your work.
